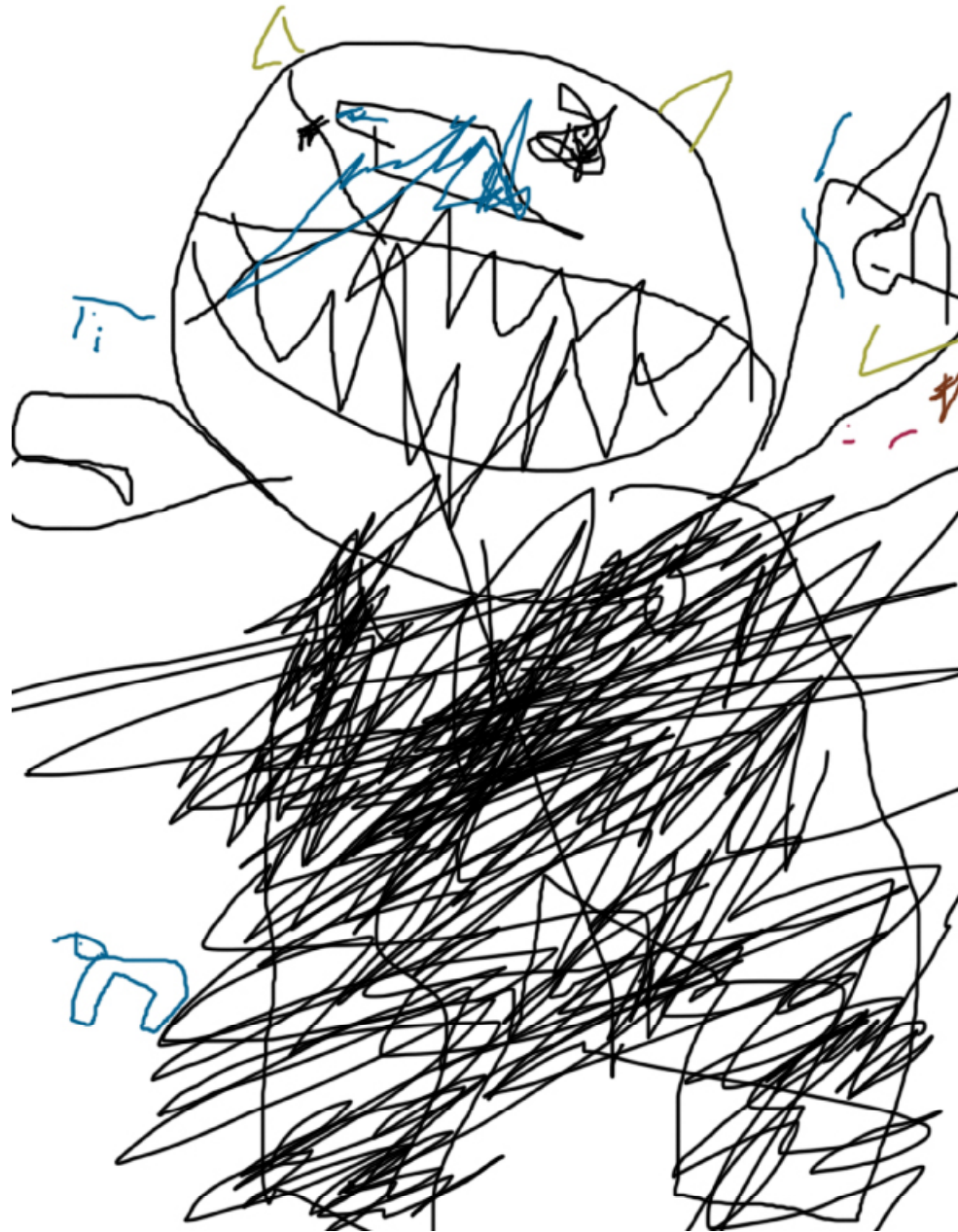

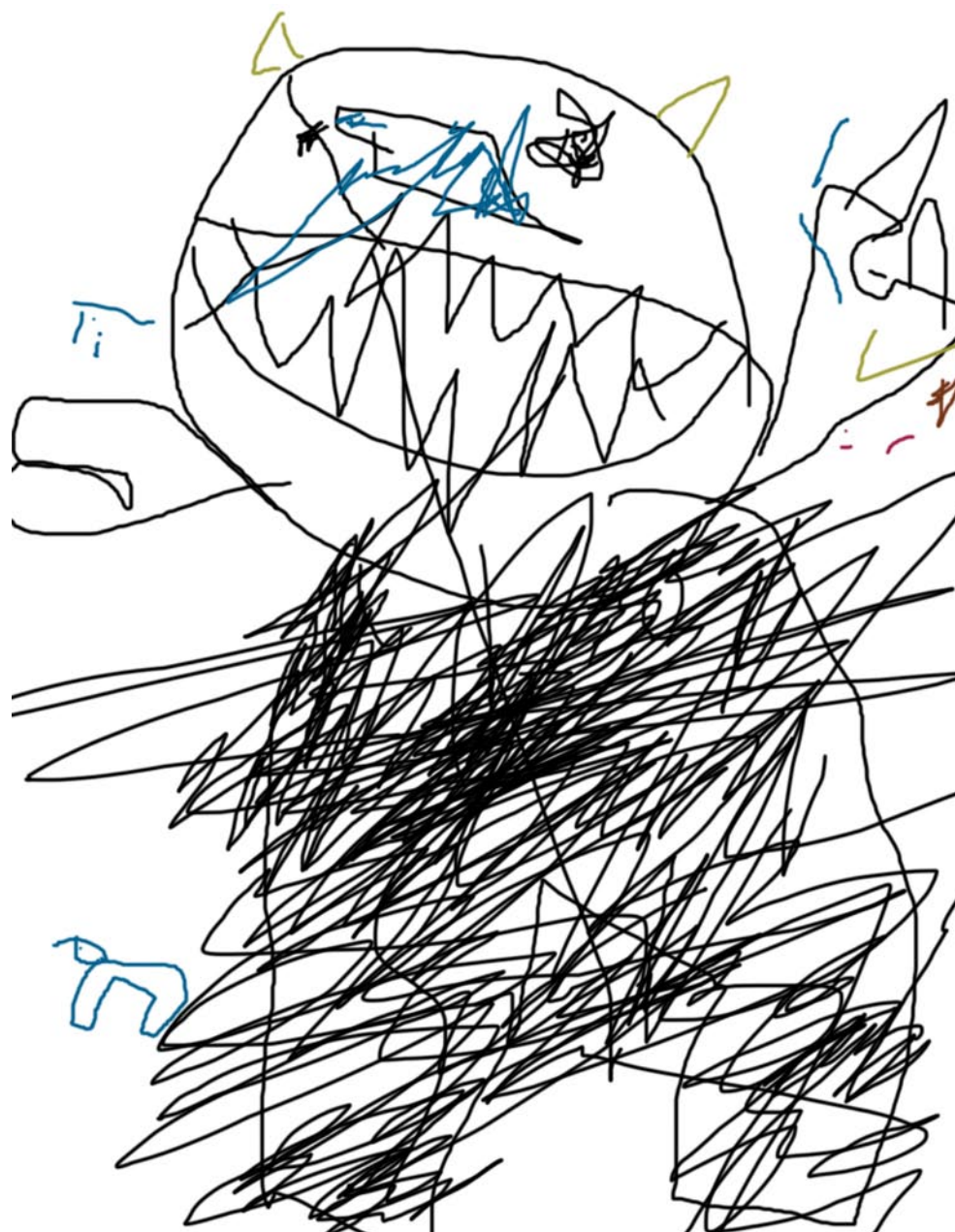

Hunting with Uncle

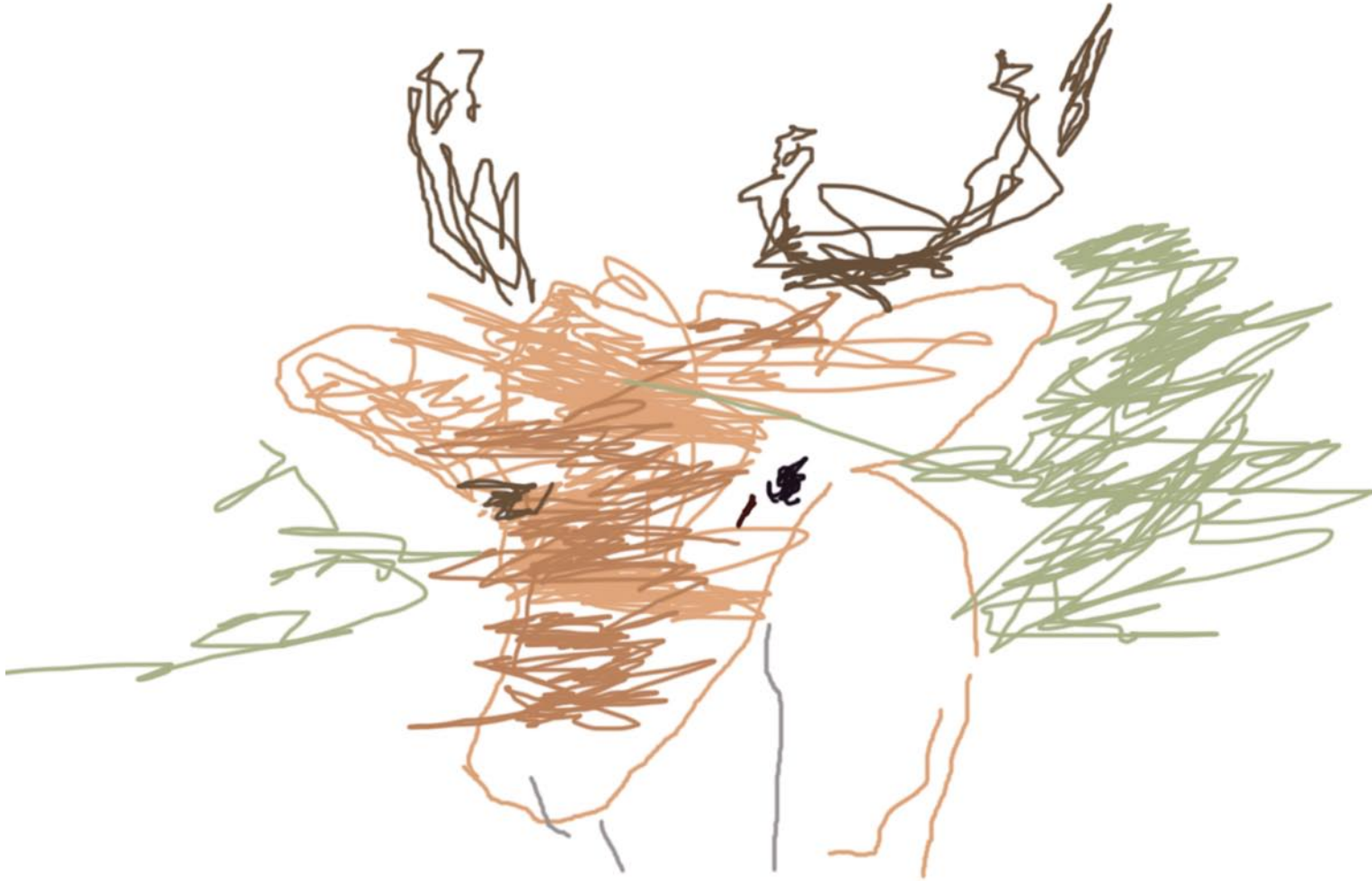
